House Looks Better Than Ever as Repairs Near Completion; Insurance Claim Adjusted

The home of Zeta Beta Tau on Edgecliff has returned nearly to its normal state what with the remodeling and reconstruction work just about completed at this writing. The house has been rebulit just about the same as before, no major changes having been made. Only difference is in the decoration of rooms and in the roof covering.

The new roof is entirely covered with slate, instead of the wooden shingles formerly used. The new covering is much more substantial and certainly fire-proof. The walls of all rooms downstairs have been painted a lighter shade, although the woodwork remains the dull, Old-English finish.

All floors in the south wing have been rebuilt, hardwood used throughout. New drainage of the floor area in the second-floor bath has been installed and a new tile floor laid. A clothes closet has been added to the top floor.

The fire-place chimney, which appeared as though it needed replacing,

has been found to be perfectly intact, although some bracing was done. The work is being handled by the Ward Construction Company, Ithaca firm which built the house originally, and details are supervised by "Ned" Feinberg '06, treasurer of the Kappa Holding Corporation.

The chapter is pleased to announce that settlement of insurance claims have been entirely satisfactory and in full. The settlement on damage to the house itself amounted to \$11,976.99 which is to be paid to the Holding Corporation.

The furniture claim amounts to \$980.82 which covers all damage in that connection. And, very fortunately for undergraduates, the chapter's insurance policy contained a clause covering personal effects of resident members and guests. Adjustment for such effects amounted to \$3,777.46.

tic storage area where most of the boys had their trunks; otherwise the personal-effects claim would have been considerably less since but few of the study rooms were damaged to any extent. Credit for adjusting this latter claim belongs in a good measure to Marne Oberbauer '41 who served as chairman of the committee appointed for that purpose.

The total claim on the house itself will be used to restore the building to its former condition; likewise is true of the furniture claim. Losses to chapter members will be paid to individual members through the chapter's accountant, T. B. Maxfield, to whom the claim has been given. It may be of interest to know the total amount of insurance carried on the house, furnishings and personal belongings amounted to \$40,000.
