Cornell Assumes Control Of Radio Station WHCU

Cornell recently took over the full management of radio station WESG which it has long owned, but leased to the Elmira Star Gazette. The call letters have been changed to WH-CU (Home of Cornell University), and programs now eminate from the campus on a 7:00 a.m to 9:00 p.m. schedule at 850 kilocycles and 1,000 watts power.

The transmitter has always been located at Ithaca even though most of the programs formerly originated in Elmira. The station also carries many programs of the Columbia Broadcasting System and will probably broadcast all of the football games this fall.

Campus Odds and Ends

Sage Chapel is being altered this summer, the building lengthened toward the West, the pews turned around to face West, and a new organ is being installed, along with a new choir loft.

The Cornell Alumni News has been taken over by the University, the editorial rooms moved from downtown to Alumni House on East Avenue. The publication is issued weekly, during the college year, and several times during the summer.

Cornell has a new, temporary, crew house on the East shore opposite Glenwood hotel from where the shells can get on the lake early in the spring instead of waiting for the inlet to thaw as has been the case in former years.

Here is an early issue of the Summit Sun which Paul Franklin '20 wrote about in your last issue. I am glad to learn of Paul, and read your paper with much interest. It is better than ours.

Incidentally, I have a pretty fat album of Kappa mementos of the 1916-20 period—printed matter, photos, souvenirs etc. It is in a very ragged and unkempt condition but if you boys would want to spend a little time giving it a fresh cover I will gladly give it to the house. Any fellows of classes '17 thru '23 who return would find in it a great deal to recall old friends and times.

The Summit Sun is dated November, 1920 — Volume 2, Number 1. Alvin E. West 21 was editor; Bruno V. Bitker '19, advisory editor; and Arthur S. Baker '22, William S. Gutwillig '22, associate editors. On the front page is a picture of former coach, Gil Dobie, who had come to Cornell that year from Navy; the accompanying article was an enthusiastic writeup of the 1920 football campaign which was marred at that writing by one defeat—that at the hands of Dartmouh.

New pledges were listed, and included Segal '23, Anspacher '24, Davis 24, Koehler '24, Manheimer '24, Schlenker '24, Weiner '24 and Taussig '24.

The writer of the above letter was mentioned as being an assistant chemist for the Commercial Chemical Co., Memphis, Tenn. Five marriages were mentioned, and several-engagements noted. The paper received its name from the fact that ZBT was at that time located at 109 Summit Avenue—Ed.


