Construction is Started On New Engineering Unit

Some weeks ago the Cornell Alumni News ran a sketch of proposed new buildings on the campus; and ground has already been broken for one of them—Olin Hall for Chemical Engineering.

The new building will be the result of a \$700,000 gift by Franklin W. Olin '85 and is being erected in front of Sage College at the corner of Central Avenue and Campus Road.

The structure will contain three stories and basement; faced in native building stone it will contain over 100,000 square feet of floor space which will include many laboratories, class rooms and offices.

The new group of engineering buildings will all be built between Barnes Hall and the Kappa Alpha House. The Old Armory is scheduled to go when enough funds are available to start other buildings, especially the new athletic building on the present baseball field.

Cornell Indoor Teams Start Off '41 Season With Good Showing

Basketball Team Must Defeat Dartmouth To Win Title

Most indoor sports got off to a good start during January, particularly basketball which has battled through five league games, winning four, and dropping a heart-breaker to Dartmouth before a record crowd in Barton Hall by a close score. Dartmouth is defending champion, and is undefeated so far this season.

Cornell has been without the services of its lanky captain and forward, Duke Ramsey (Psi U), who has been on pro. If he is permitted to return to the lineup in the second term, the Big Red may "take" the Indians on the Hanover court; and if so, Cornell will have a good chance for the 1941 title. Otherwise, it looks to be all Dartmouth again.

The wrestlers met Army and Columbia during January and experienced not too much difficulty in picking up two victories. The team has a balanced group of grapplers this year. The boxing team is the uncertainty so far. Forfeiting in two classes, they lost the opening meet to Syracuse, winning but two bouts, with one declared no contest. The real test here comes February 15 when the Penn State boxers invade the Hill.

Track hasn't started yet; the skiers looked good in taking Colgate and Syracuse in a triangular meet; and the swimming team is about average.
