System of Preferential Bids Installed During Rushing

When rushees received their bids they were to turn them in at Willard Straight desk enclosed in one envelope, and were to mark on the outside of the envelope the houses they would pledge, and the order of their preference. All in all, fraternity rushing had a good year. Whether or not that was due to the new rules is very debatable, particularly by houses which did not reach their quota.

Looking Over the Local Scene; Total Enrollment Remains Over 7 Thousand

The new structure is not in place as yet. The piers and footings are being constructed, but steel for the bridge itself has not arrived. Completion of the work was promised for mid-winter, but delay in steel shipment makes that date an uncertainty.

Olin Hall for Chemical Engineering is rapidly nearing completion, although considerable work does remain on the interior. The exterior is of field stone (similar to Willard Straight Hall) and brick. Location of the building is the corner of Central Avenue and Campus Road.

Enrollment at Cornell remained slightly above 7,000 again this year, but it took a record freshman class to maintain that total. The draft and attractive jobs in defense industries picked a number of men from the upper classes, as was expected.


