Bidding to Be Done By Card, Not in Person

This article is for the freshmen—the men of '45.

Fraternity rushing at Cornell has long been considered a hectic time. Formerly, there were four concentrated days, beginning the very first day of registration, of fraternity men calling upon freshmen, and freshmen visiting houses for meals and social calls. This year you new men are getting a break.

Rushing does not start this fall until Wednesday following the Monday of registration. There will be six days in all, with a "moratorium" of no rushing on Sunday. This spreads the occasion over a longer period, gives the freshman more time to select his house, and gives the house more time in selecting the men it wishes to pledge.

#### Rushing Dates in General

When a freshman has a date with us, one or two of our members will call for him at his room, or possibly meet him on the campus if it is a luncheon date. He is taken to the house where he can meet the membership of the chapter, look over the premises; have lunch or dinner as the case may be, and perhaps indulge in bridge, ping pong or just plain conversation afterwards.

Formerly, freshmen were pledged to houses on the fourth night of rushing, and were usually pledged at the house. This year fraternities may present written bids to freshmen on



Zeta Beta Tau has a rather unique home at Cornell. It is perched on a ledge which offers a view over the city of Ithaca and over Lake Cayuga, as well as a view of the largest waterfall in this section of the state. The first floor of the house is comfortably furnished and equipped—the dining room regularly serving approximately 40 men. Study rooms are arranged in suites of two rooms, one for study and one for sleeping. There are two and three men to a suite depending upon its size. Twenty-two can live in the house at one time.

There is a game room in the basement equipped with ping pong table, piano, benches, etc. The lawn around the house is large enough for softball or a little football; and in the winter we usually construct a rink for ice skating. The house is owned by the Alumni Corporation to which the undergraduate chapter pays rent.
