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Diesel Engineering Lab Erected on Sage Green; Navy Fills Men's Dorms

Fraternities Asked to Move Freshmen Into Houses During Room Shortage

The Naval Training Station continues to occupy an important place in Cornell's life this year. While the large complement expected didn't quite materialize, there are nearly 800 men here at present, enrolled in either the indoctrination school, or in Diesel engineering. The communications school was moved to Harvard, which accounts somewhat for fewer men being stationed here than expected.

A new Diesel engineering laboratory has just been completed on Sage Green near the Old Armory, but is a temporary proposition. Being portable in construction, it will be moved to another site following the war. Six large masts dot the remainder of the Green, and are used for instruction in flag communication.

The presence of so many navy men (and in some cases their families) has given a lift to Ithaca business, both retail and real estate. Except for the sight of many uniforms, Ithaca shows few outward signs of war-time.

Miscellaneous News Items

By virtue of an Interfraternity Council ruling, all fraternity initiations will take place on a set weekend during December. The Council also ruled that informal and formal initiating activities must be confined to the period of Friday at 4:00 p.m. to Sunday at 9:00 p.m. After a starvation diet concerning Big Red football successes, the campus had its first opportunity to celebrate on Saturday night, November 7, following a very sweet victory over Yale. The day was marred only by the fact that the 150-pound team didn't get by Princeton in its bid for the Eastern championship.

Physical Training Compulsory; House Parties, Dances Reduced

Cornell has compulsory physical training for all men students this year—three hours per week for the two upper classes, two hours for the lower classes The program includes a variety of sports and exercises, plus one hour per week on the "Commando" course on Kite Hill behind the Crescent, considered just about the toughest layout on any college campus.

Another new ruling by the University decrees that no student party may last more than one day—which puts an end to Junior Week and Spring Day for the duration. All big dances have been canceled.

Cornell's Enrollment Off 500; Cars Prohibited for Duration

Cornell is different this year. The campus has a strange, barren look that puzzles the new-comer for a minute until he remembers that student cars are now prohibited Our leg calves are getting bigger, our wind is much improved, and the "Commando" course which you might have seen in the news reels helps to put us in condition for the impending military training.

Enrollment is off about 500 at Cornell as compared with last year. The incoming class has increased by approximately 100, giving a total of nearly 6000 students in all. Fraternity rushing has proved highly successful with nearly 700 men pledged—an all-time high.

Many of the boys in the house are in the enlisted reserves, but recent headlines about lowering the draft age demands proper attention. Cornell and ZBT are getting ready to face the realities of war.
