Freund '29 Leads Many - Faceted Life; Travels Widely to Collect His Material

Author, playwrite, free - lance writer, documentary film expert, teacher, world traveler . . . all of these fields of endeavor are the occupations of one man Philip H. Freund, a Kappa who graduated from Cornell in 1929 at the age of 19 . . . with honors.

Brother Freund is a native of Vancouver, British Columbia, who entered Cornell in 1925, where he majored in literature, philosophy, and drama.

Following graduation, Phil set out to take New York City by storm, but the Depression came along and he quit his job with a public utility company.

Philip then decided to hike across the United States. This was followed by trips to Panama and Canada. Larger - scale "wanderlust" got the better of him and he headed for Europe and the wider opportunities of travel and writing it offered.

THROWN OUT OF RUSSIA

For a year, Phil criss-crossed Europe - hiking, sightseeing, and writing in Spain, Italy, Corsica, Poland, Austria, and Russia. While there he wrote short stories and articles. He was also expelled by the Soviet government for having 'visa problems' and "a bad temper".

Freund returned to Cornell in 1931 to get his Master's degree with a thesis on D. H. Lawrence.

For the next 15 years, he was an author and free-lance writer, until World War II, when he served in the Army Signal Corps Training Film Unit as a writer, assistant producer, and head of the Scenerio Board of Review.

To date, Phil has published some 30 books - including eight

novels, both here and abroad. Among them are "Easter Island", "The Dark Shore", and "The Volcano God". The latter book was described by the "Literary Journal as "one of the world's longest novels". Phil says it's only 1150 pages long!

Others of Phil's works include volumes of poetry, literary criticism, psychology, and plays. His most recent book. "The Beholder: Seven Tales of Sebastian Romm", was published in London last year, where "The Devious Ways" - a collection of four novellas - will be issued in August.

As a playwrite, Freund has had a number of one-act plays published and two off-Broadway productions. He frets that several of

Tony reports that things are looking good for them, since their latest single record "Cleopatra, Queen of the Nile" - which they wrote - is breaking big in several places throughout the country. This folk - type tune is backed with "All My Trials."

Phil also found time to enter the field of documentary films as a writer and script consultant. As such, he was appointed Expert Consultant" to the Secretary of the Army and travelled to Berlin to help prepare propaganda films democratize the German people.

In 1945, he ventured into the teaching field, as an instructor in documentary film writing at City College of New York, and started lecturing on playwriting, television writing, and the history of the drama at Hunter College.

During Summer School, 1946, Phil conducted a creative writing workshop here at Cornell and also inaugurated the film courses still being offered on "the Hill."

Other teacher assignments have been at the University of British Columbia. and at Fordham University.

When he finds time, Brother Fruend still travels in the Americas, North Africa, and parts of Europe and still works for various national newspapers and magazines.
