Gene Kaufmann's Death Ends Record Of Service to Cornell U. and ZBT

Last October 21st, Zeta Beta Tau lost a great brother and Cornell University lost a devoted alumnus when Eugene Marks Kaufmann, Jr., '26 died

of a heart attack at the Cornell Club in New York City.

Of the 60 years of Gene Kaufmann's life, a good portion of it was dedicated to the University that he loved. As an undergraduate he served his fraternity as steward house manager and treasurer. He became both Phi Beta Kappa and Phi Kappa Phi. As an alumnus, he devoted the remainder of his years to various forms of service where his activities included: vice-president of the Cornell Alumni Fund, in which capacity he served for more than 10 years. He was a member of the Advisory Council Cornell Graduate School of Business and Public Relations Conference Committee. He was a member of the Cornell clubs of New York and Philadelphia.

Gene operated his own investment advisory organization in Philadelphia for more than 25 years, and in January of 1964 he became vice-president and manager of Philadelphia offices of Van Strum and Towne Inc., the highly respected investment counseling firm. It was in this capacity that he was serving at the time of his death. In 1939 Gene authored the book, "Investing for a Widow." Of his many and varied interests, books were high on the list. His Philadelphia apartment was filled with a fine and rare collection. It is fitting that the Kaufmann collection of eighliterature teenth - century should provide the foundation upon which Eugene Kaufmann's memory is most durably established.

In his tribute to Gene, George H. Healey, Professor of the English Department and Curator of Rare Books for Cor-


