Rushing Highly Successful For CU Greeks; Freshman Affiliation Up From 56% to 64%

Rush Week, 1967, has been a resounding success for Cornell's Fraternity system. During the first 10 days of February, 1075 freshmen made the decision to join a fraternity. Although down 25 men from last year's total of 1100, this year's figure represented a jump from 56% to 64% affiliation for the freshmen class which is 10% smaller this year. The average pledge class size is 20 men.

The success of the 1967 Rush is even greater when one considers the fact that this year's freshmen have been challenged by the University community to give great consideration in weighing the merits of the fraternity system. Their decision and the actions taken by the fraternity system to

strengthen itself have provided renewed confidence in the important role the system plays in the University community.
